The Sanma Provincial Statistics Office through the Vanuatu National Statistics Office (VNSO) is pleased to publish the second Provincial Statistical Indicator (PSI) report. This report is an update of the first Sanma PSI report published in 2015.

Statistics is very important in the socio-economic development and planning process in every country; as such for Vanuatu. In 2016, Vanuatu initiated a National Sustainable Development Plan (NSDP 2016 – 2030) which consists of the economic, social and environmental aspects of the livelihood of the people of Vanuatu. This report will greatly contribute to the monitoring of the progress of the NSDP at the provincial level.

A snapshot analysis of the indicators was from the province of Sanma. Detailed information on different topics and tables of special interest can be obtained from other publications or directly from other VNSO reports and databases.

VNSO will continue to work on this same report for other provinces, and ensure that the report is compiled on an annual basis. The purpose of this report is to provide a basic overview about Socio-Economic status of the province of Sanma with emphasis on administrative data to;

- provide a general overview of the vast amount of detailed information that is available at the provincial level;
- generate interest and desire for more sub national information, for decision and policy makers especially at the provincial level, and
- enhance the decision-making process at the provincial level and sub provincial level.

I would like to thank all stakeholders who have made contributions towards the entire compilation of this report. It is a collective effort and we will continue to work together in the future to improve on our reporting and the quality data collected. 

1. Population

1.1 Population of Sanma Province

The population of Sanma province is about 58,917 in 2018 according to Sanma population projection estimates 2009-2018, 52% of them were male and 48% female. Like other provinces, Sanma population has a young age structure with 19% of the population aged less than 15 years and only 3% aged over 60 years as shown by the population pyramid.

1.2 Population Density

Density is a good indicator or measure of how a place is crowded or scattered. The higher the number of youth population, the higher the crowding.

Sanma province has a total land area of 4,286 km square and a total population of 54,182 according to the 2016 population Mini census. This means that the average population density for Sanma province was 13 persons per km square, an increase of two people, from 11 people per km square since 2009.

1.3 Sex Ratio

Differences between the number of males and females can be seen using the sex ratio. In 2016, the sex ratio for Sanma province was 105 – meaning that for every 100 females, there are 105 males. There are more males than Females in Sanma province.



2. Youth

2.1 Youth Population

The age group of 12-30 years is used in the official youth policy and accounts for 21,540 of young people in the Sanma Province in 2018, according to Sanma population projection estimates 2009-2018. Youth population by sex with 52% (11,152) being males compared to 48% (10,388) females. In addition, youth population represents 19% of the total population of Sanma province.

Figure 2: Youth population estimates for Sanma province, 2018




3. Health

3.1 Environmental Diseases

Environmental diseases in Sanma province recorded some interesting figures. The records shows skin sepsis at 35% in 2016, conjunctives went up to 29% and scabies at 14%. The lowest records was other eye infections conditions in 2016 at 2%, Fish poisoning and yaws 1% each.

3.2 Outpatient consultations

Figure 4 shows the number of outpatient consultations by facility type. Total facilities recorded an increase of 11% from 2016 to 2017. Aid Posts increased by 36%, Specialized clinics by 21%, Health Centres and Dispensaries by 10% and OPD and Emergency by 1%.

3.3 Birth Deliveries

Birth Deliveries in Sanma Province recorded an increase of 4% from 2016 to 2017 but decreased by 4% in 2018 over 2017.

More than half of the Birth Deliveries occur in hospitals with 67% share followed by Health Centres/Dispensaries at 23%, Community setting (by TBA) at 6%, Aid Posts at 3% and Community setting (without SBA or TBA) at 1%.

Figure 5: Number of Births Deliveries Registration in Sanma, 2016-2018





4. Education

4.1 Number of Schools in Vanuatu

According to VEMIS report the Early Childhood Education (ECE) recorded the highest in 2018 with 838 enrolments, followed by Primary school with 455 enrolments. Secondary school is slowly picking up while the Post school education and training remained constant compared to 2016 to 2017.

Figure 6: Number of Schools in Vanuatu, 2016-2018



4.2 Pupils Class Ratio for primary schools, Sanma province

Student Classroom Ratio (SCR) is defined as average number of pupils per classroom. In a school year the ideal size is 30 students per classroom. The steady trend show that the SCR is within the range of 30 students per classroom in 2018 with the highest number of students is 23 per classroom.

Figure 7: Pupils-Classroom Ratio for primary school, Sanma Province, 2016-2018



4.3 Student Teacher Ratio, Sanma province

According to VEMIS reports the standard student teacher ratio is 1 teacher to 30 students. Sanma Province has shown a positive progress in this standard throughout each of the educational level in which the student teacher ratio lies within the standard range. In contrast, the highest student teacher ratio is evident within the ECE level in 2017 with ratio of 1 teacher to 31 students.

Figure 8: Student Teacher Ratio, Sanma Province, 2016 – 2018



4.4 Teachers by education level, Sanma province

The total number of teachers has shown an increase of 967 in 2018 compared to 904 in the previous year. By educational level, ECE recorded an increase of 19% in 2018 and Primary at 5% while Secondary decreased by 2% over the previous year.

Figure 9: Number of Teachers by School Type, Sanma Province, 2016-2018





5.1 Crime Rates

The Crime rates over the past three years decreased. Total number of reported offenses in Sanma Province decreased by 10% in 2018 over the previous year.

5.2 Offense by type

The table below ranks the "top 10" type of crimes committed in 2016-2018. In 2016 the most common crime was disorderly, indecent, drunk behaviour with a share of 18%. Intentional assault and malicious damage both had the highest share of 16% of the crimes committed in 2017. And in 2018 the highest type of crime recorded was theft with 18% share from top 10 crimes.



6. Employment

The total contributing VNPF members in 2018 recorded an increase of 14% over 2017 compared to 13% increase from 2016 to 2017. By Gender, the proportion of males is higher by 56% compared to females at 44% in 2018.

7.1 Total Revenue

The total Government revenue between 2016 and 2018 has shown an increase in the Government revenue collection. The increase was 15% from 2016 to 2017 and 19% from 2017 to 2018.

Figure 12: Accumulated Growth in the Government Revenue (In Million VT), Sanma Province, 2018





Figure 14: Total Energy consumption records for Luganville, 2016-2017



Figure 15: Source of Electricity usage by percentage, Luganville, 2016-2017





9. Transport

9.1 Motor vehicle registration

Motor vehicle registrations increased in 2017 by 64% or 111 new registrations compared to 2016. And in 2018, new registrations also recorded an increase of 65% or 185 over the previous year.

Figure 16: Registered number of Motor vehicles, Sanma, 2016-2018





9.2 International Vessels

Total international vessels servicing Luganville increased in 2017 by 24% compared to 2016 but decreased by 39% in 2018 over 2017. The most common vessel at Santo port is the Container vessel with 67% share in 2016, 57% in 2017 and 73% in 2018.

Figure 17: Percentage of international vessels called in at Santo Port, 2016-2018



9.3 International flights to Pekoa Airport

Air Vanuatu is the main international airline operator at Pekoa Airport with an average of 8 flights per month in 2018. Between the periods of 2016-2018, the highest recorded number of flights was in 2016 with 111 flights, followed by 107 and 101 flights in 2017 and 2018 respectively.

10. Tourism

10.1 Total International Visitors

In 2018 the total number of tourists arriving in Sanma was 11,523. Throughout the year the highest tourist arrivals to Sanma was recorded in July with 1,732 tourists while December recorded the lowest with only 357 tourists.

Figure 20: Purpose of visits for tourists to Sanma Province, 2018



Figure 22: Average Nights Spent by Visitors by Provinces, 2018





Figure 23: Active Cooperatives in Sanma Province, 2018



11.3 Cooperative Membership

The total membership increased while turnover and the shared dividend to members both decreased from 2016 to 2018:

- Membership increased by 18% in 2017 over 2016 and also increased by 1% in 2018 compared to 2017.
- Annual total turnover shows a decrease of 18% in 2017 over 2016 and continued to decrease by 23% from 2017 to 2018.
- Total dividend shared to members recorded a decrease of 9% from 2016 to 2017 and also fell by 1% in 2018 over 2017.



Figure 25: Total Business Registration in Sanma Province, 2016 - 2018



According to the Sanma overseas trade, trade deficit stood at 1,782 million vatu in 2016, 1,738 million vatu in 2017 and also deteriorate by 3,942 million vatu in 2018 due to high imports and less exports.

Total imports recorded highest in 2018 at 6,792 million vatu when compared to the two previous years. This indicated an increase of 14% or 835 million vatu over 2017 and 19% or 1,017 million vatu over 2016 respectively.

Domestic exports for 2017 recorded the highest of the three years at 4,219 million vatu. This increase was mainly driven by copra and kava exports. 2018 registered an amount of 2,850 million vatu in domestics exports.

Figure 27: Sanma's Overseas Trade (in Million Vatu), 2016 – 2018





13.2 Export

In Quantity

Copra Production tops Sanma exports from 2016 to 2018 with the highest production in 2016 at 27,932 tonnes. Despite being the highest exported product, it recorded declines in 2016 at 20% and 2017 at 69% in 2018.


Figure 28: Top 5 Exports in Tonnes, 2018



In Value terms

In value terms, Copra export recorded the highest in 2016 and 2017 at VT 1,696 million and VT 1,181 million respectively. However, in 2018 Copra exports decreased in value, except for Kava exports with a highest value of VT 1,701 million within the same period.


Figure 29: Total Value of top 5 Domestic Exports (VT Million), 2018

Figure 31: Production for Export in Value for Sanma Province, 2018





Percentage share Top Five Domestic Exports

Out of the top five domestic product exports, Copra recorded the largest share to Sanma's total domestic products in 2016 and 2018 with 43% and 11%, compared to the rest of the domestic products.

Kava exports recorded the second highest share of over 60%, followed by coconut oil at 15%, Copra at 12%, Cocoa at 7% and sawn timber at 2% in 2018.

Figure 32: Percentage share -Top Five Domestic Product Exports 2018



13.3 Imports for Home Consumption

Out of the top five commodity items imported by Sanma Province, Machines and Transport equipment recorded highest value in 2017 at 31 million vatu, while food and live animals, recorded highest in 2017 at 22 million vatu, basic manufactured goods recorded highest value in 2016 at 18 million vatu, miscellaneous goods at 15 million vatu in 2017 and Mineral fuels at 10 million vatu in 2017.



15. Provincial level data Challenges

There are several difficulties associated with the analysis of Provincial level Statistics. The coverage of statistical indicators varies within the geographical distribution. Being one of the main contributing factors, the collection and analysis of the statistical data had a great impact from the range of geographical hierarchy from the Area Council level to the Village level resulting in underutilization of statistical reporting. Thus, the snapshots of most of the socioeconomic indicators of analyses were from particular areas within the provincial boundaries, used as a representation of the entire province statistical outlook.

Systems of collection and management of statistical information or data across entities is another contributing factor as most of the data providers do not have a proper system of collection and storage of data. Resources, both financial and human resource capacity contribute to the variation of the data collected.

Statistical literacy continues to be another challenge however with the setup of provincial statistical offices, one of the objectives is to promote statistical literacy and the importance on the use of statistics in all levels of decision and policy making.
