

- provide a general overview of the vast amount of detailed information that is available at the provincial level;
- generate interest and desire for more sub national information, for decision and policy makers especially at the provincial level, and
- Enhance the decision-making process at the provincial level and sub provincial level.

I would like to thank all stakeholders who have made contribution towards the entire compilation of this report. It is a collective effort and we will continue to work together in the future to improve on our reporting in terms of quality data collected. The Torba Provincial Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) is acknowledged in this regard.

I am especially grateful for the initiative, the leadership, and the enormous amount of work for the collection, compilation, and analysis and reporting by the provincial statistics officers.





Summary of Key Indicators, Torba Province



1. Population

1.1 Population of Torba Province

The 2020 National Population census results showed that around 11,330 people were living in private households in Torba province of which 50% were male and 50% were female. The Torba province population pyramid has a wide base showing that it has predominantly a young population with 40% of the population aged under 15 years and only 6% aged over 60 years as shown by the narrow top of the population pyramid.




Figure 1. 1: Population by Sex and Age, Torba Province, 2020

1.2 Population Density

Density is a good indicator of how population is distributed by area.

Torba province has a total land area of 882 km2 (for both Banks and Torres islands) and a total population of 11,330 according to the 2020 National Population census. This means that the average population density for Torba province is 13 persons per km2, an increase by one person, from 12 persons per km2 in 2016 from the mini census.

1.3 Sex Ratio

Differences between the number of males and females can be measured using the sex ratio. In 2009, the sex ratio for Torba province was 102, meaning that there are 102 males for every 100 females. It also means that there are slightly higher number of males than females in Torba. In 2020, the sex ratio for Torba has remained at a steady 102.



1.4 Population Growth

Torba province growth rate has decreased from an annual average of 1.9% from periods 1999 to 2009, to 1.8% from periods 2009 to 2020.







2. Youth

2.1 Youth Population

The age group of 12-30 years is used in the official youth policy to define the youth group. In Torba, the youth population accounts for 3,583 of people in Torba Province. According to the 2020 National Population census, 49.9% (1,787) were males compared to 50.1% (1,796) who were females. The youth population represents 31.6% of the total population of Torba province.





Figure 2. 1: Youth Population by Sex and Age, Torba Province, 2020

3. Health

3.1 Deliveries (Births)


Total deliveries recorded in 2018 were 179. Deliveries in health centres/dispensaries were highest with 100 deliveries and the lowest was 11 deliveries in aid posts. More women go to health centres/dispensaries to deliver their babies attended by mid-wives or skilled birth attendants.



3.2 Birth Registration

Total number of births registered for Torba in 2020 increased by 50% from a total of 3,525 in 2019 to 6,525. There was an increase of registered births for all age groups above 6 years from 2019 to 2020. On the other hand, there was a decline in birth registrations for ages 0-1 and 2-5 in 2020 Birth registrations with 'No Age' rose the most, from 1,308 in 2019 to 3,932 in 2020.






3.3 In-Patient Admissions

In 2018 there were more in-patient admissions in health centres/dispensaries, (72%) than hospitals (28%) and none in Aid-Posts. These figures indicate that more patient access health services from the health centres and dispensaries compared to the hospital and aid-posts.







4. Education

4.1 Total Number of Students in Torba by School Type

By education level, the ECCE stood very high throughout the three years (2018 to 2020) recording the highest number of 876 students in 2020 compared to 838 students in 2018. In percentage terms, the number of students attending ECCE schools grew by the smallest at 5%, primary at 6% and secondary at 10%.


Figure 4. 1: Total Number of Students in Torba Province by School Type, 2018-2020



4.2 Total Enrolments

According to the 2020 Open VEMIS, total enrolments for Torba was at 3,280 in 2020. This shows a 5% decrease from 3,432 enrolments in 2019 and a 2% decrease from 3.331 enrolments in 2018.

4.3 Student-Teacher Ratio

According to the MoET regulation order number 44 of 2005, the national Student-Teacher ratio by education level should be no more than 15 pupils to 1 teacher in ECE, 1 teacher to 30 pupils in Primary, and 25-30 students per teacher in Secondary level.

In Torba, for the ECCE level, the student-teacher ratio gradually increased from 12 in 2018 to 14 in 2020. Primary level shows a slight increase to 1 teacher to 29 students in 2020 from 1:28 in 2018 and 2019 respectively. The student-teacher ratio for secondary level in 2018 was at 1:20, and increased by 30% to 1:26 in 2020.






Figure 4. 3: Student – Teacher Ratio, Torba Province, 2018-2020

4.4 Student Classroom Ratio for Primary Schools

In accordance to VEMIS digest annual reports, Student Classroom Ratio (SCR) is defined as average number of pupils per classroom, and in a school year the ideal size should be no more than 30 students per classroom. The growth trend in SCR for Torba province is below the standard ideal size and is at a steady 22 students per classroom in the period 2018 to 2020.

4.5 Number of Teachers by Level of Education The number of teaching staff by sex indicates that from 2018 to 2019, there is a slight increase in total

female staff from 110 to 112 compared to male teachers with a decrease from 65 to 62. However, in 2020 total male teachers increased marginally to 63 teachers from the previous year, while the number of female staff marginally decreased to 111 over the previous year. Overall, throughout the period studied, numbers of male and female teachers remained relatively constant.

By educational level, female staff were dominant over males on all levels (ECCE, Primary and Secondary) throughout the three years, accounting for over 60% of total teachers in each year.



5. Justice

5.1 Court Cases by Type

Court cases recorded for Torba in 2020 showed that Debt cases were leading with 27 cases, followed by civil with 12 cases then child maintenance, enforcement and Chiefly title with the least. However, in 2018, civil cases had the highest share while no other cases were recorded for that year and year 2019.







6. Employment

6.1 VNPF Membership

Total contributing members has shown a steady increase over the periods of 2016 to 2018 of which the number of males was higher than female members. However, since 2018 there has been a decline in contributing members. In 2018 there were 66% male and 34% female contributing members.






6.2 Unemployment Rate

Unemployment is defined as people who are aged 15 years and over who were looking for a job during the census period and are available to work should there be any job available.

Furthermore, unemployment rate is derived from this group of people, divided by total population active within the labour force with the same attributes and multiplied by 100. Torba has had an increase of 0.2 percentage points from 2009 to 5.2 in 2020, shown by Table 6.2. This means for every 100 people there are 5.2 persons who are still looking for a job compared to 0.2 persons in 2009.



In addition, unemployment rate for females increased from 0.1 percent points to 6 percent points. There are more females who are unemployed than males in Torba in 2020.






7. Government Finance Statistics (GFS)

7.1 Total Revenue

Total Government revenue collection between 2016 and 2019 had significant growth in Torba Province. In 2016, the revenue collection for Torba was around 762 thousand vatu and increased by 81% in 2017 to 1.38 million vatu. After a decline in 2018, in 2019 the collection made a huge increase again by 203% to 2.77 million vatu compared to 2018.

7.2 Quarterly Revenue

In 2016, 2017 and 2019 the highest peak of revenue collection was done over quarter 4 except for 2018 and 2020 where the highest peak of revenue collection was over quarter 1.

7.3 Government Revenue Collectors

The following table ranks the top 10 Government revenue collectors over the period from 2016 to 2020 in terms of revenue collected. The Customs department is the top revenue collector with VT 2,053,521 million, Energy ranks second with VT 1,301,940 million, Police department comes in third with VT 1,146,130 million and then the last, or 10th, is the Agriculture department who collected revenue of 110 thousand vatu.



8. Energy

8.1 Consumption Rate

The consumption of electricity in Torba has increased from 199 KWh in 2019 to 10,825kWh in 2020, as shown in figure 11.

Figure 8. 1: Total Energy Consumption in kWh, Torba Province, 2019-2020



8.2 Sources of Electricity

The total number of people who were actively using electricity increased from 67 in the year 2019 to 106 in 2020 – showing that more people in Torba are getting access to electricity compared to previous years.

9. Production

9.1 Cattle Restocking Program, Monitoring and Evaluation

The Phase I of the 2016 cattle restocking program through the Department of Livestock highlighted a

distribution of 240 cattle to 129 cattle farmers in Torba.

Monitoring and evaluation of the restocking program in 2018 shows that, there has been a very high increase in cattle production of which 183 calves (young domestic cow or bull) were added to the initial stock, showing an almost 80% increase or 423 cattle heads in total.






Figure 9. 1: Monitoring and Evaluation, Torba Province, 2018

9.2 Forestry

A forest is a large area covered chiefly with trees and undergrowth. It plays an important role in the socioeconomic and traditional aspects of people's livelihood. Figure 9.2 below shows the percentage of trees planted in Vanuatu from 2016 to 2021. The highest percentage of trees planted, out of all trees planted in the period studied, was in 2016 accounting for 52.2% of all trees planted; this then suffered a huge drop down to 8.1% in the following year of 2017 and gradually increased over the next 3 years to 13.5% in 2021.





There are about five species of trees that are being planted for forestry purposes in all six provinces of Vanuatu. Clearly in 2019, whitewood had the highest figure of 10,045 trees followed by sandalwood with 4,947 trees and the least is nangai with 555 trees, which is followed behind by a grouping of other trees amounting to 152 trees planted. However, compared to 2020, the largest group of trees planted was in the others category with 13,298, sandalwood was the second most popular with 6,340 trees, followed by mahogany with 3,715 trees and lastly natapoa with only 218 trees.

Figure 9. 3: Species of Trees planted in Vanuatu, 2019-2020





10. Driving Licences

10.1 Driving Licenses Issued

The number of driving licences issued in Torba Province was highest in the year 2020, at 64, followed by 2019, at 12, and the least number of licences were issued in the years 2017 and 2018, both at 7, as shown in figure 19. This illustrates that only a few people possess a valid driver's licence.

Figure 10. 1: Total Driver's License issued, Torba Province, 2016-2020





11. Tourism

11.1 Provincial visitors

In 2016 there was a total of 397 visitors to Torba province and that increased by 65% or 260 visitors in the following year of 2017 recording the highest number of visitors. This declined gradually over the years 2018 and 2019. It declined even further in 2020 as a result of the Covid-19 outbreak and border closure causing a huge break in the tourism industry.








12.2 Cooperative Membership, Dividend and Savings

Membership for Torba in 2016 was at a total of 351. However, that decreased by 16% to a total of 294 members in 2020. The lowest recorded number of members was in 2018.

This is an increase of 51% compared to the previous year. The lowest savings recorded was in 2016 with a total of VT 403,510.



The highest total turn-over was in 2020 with an amount of 22,097,337 million vatus, while lowest was in 2017 at 8,534,778 million vatus. The total dividend shared in 2020 stood at VT 179,800. This is a decrease of VT 450,510 compared to 2016. There was no record of dividend shared in 2019.

Provincial Data Challenges

There are several difficulties associated with the analysis of Provincial level Statistics. The coverage of statistical indicators varies within the geographical distribution. Being one of the main contributing factors, the collection and analysis of the statistical data had a great impact from the range of geographical hierarchy from the Area Council level to the Village level resulting in underutilization of statistical reporting. Thus, the snapshots of most of the socio-economic indicators of analyses were from particular areas within the provincial boundaries, used as a representation of the entire province statistical outlook.

Systems of collection and management of statistical information or data across entities is another contributing factor as most of the data providers do not have a proper system of collection and storage of data. Resources, both financial and human resource capacity contribute to the variation of the data collected.

Statistical literacy continues to be another challenge however with the setup of provincial statistical offices, one of the objectives is to promote statistical literacy and the importance on the use of statistics in all levels of decision and policy making.
